# Breanna Hosman will show sheep at 95th Little International in February

The North Dakota State University Saddle and Sirloin Club will host the 95th Little International on February 12-13, 2021.

"The Little International Livestock Show is the largest student-run event on the NDSU campus, involving more than 300 students," said Kadey Holm, Little I manager and an NDSU senior in animal sciences from Ashley, N.D. "The show features showmanship classes of beef, dairy, sheep and swine as well as ham curing and public speaking contests.

"The Little International also honors an Agriculturist of the Year: an individual who has not only excelled but also contributed substantially to the agriculture industry of North Dakota," Holm said.

This year's Agriculturist of the Year is Julie Ellingson of St. Anthony, ND, and N.D. Stockmen's Association executive vice president. Ellingson will be recognized at the February 12 Hall of Fame Banquet with a 5 p.m. social

Livestock showmanship preliminaries begin at 8 a.m. February 13 in Shepperd Arena on the NDSU campus, and showmanship finals begin at 5:30 p.m.

Breanna Hosman, a freshman at NDSU and a graduate of the Hebron High School, will be showing a sheep. Hosman is majoring in agricultural education at NDSU and is the daughter of Mike and Jen Hosman, Hebron.

piano, the townspeople would sing old German songs as Anna played the piano and Emil his Stradivarius.

But the good days were short-lived. The Great Depression hit the Krauth family hard like everyone else and a series of decisions left the grand patriarch all alone on the prairie. After Lina died in June of 1937, daughter Anna and her husband Fritz returned to Germany for an inheritance, taking along their two daughters, Mary Ann and Caroline (Conrath).

By that time, Emil's wealth had evaporated. When Anna and her children became trapped in Germany, he was unable to muster the \$700 it would take to bring them home, and they would remain in Germany until the end of the war. But he would

not live to see them. With his other two grandchildren, Fred and Ted Conrath, drafted into service, Emil passed away on Nov. 13<sup>th</sup>, 1941, with his loyal dog, "Puppy," by his side. The regal objects that had once filled his grand home on the corner of Main and Maple would be sold and scattered all over the Hebron area.

What survives of Emil Krauth are his lovely butterflies. They live on in his stead, in collection at North Dakota State University as well as the North Dakota State Historical Society. Emil once wrote, "If this delicate creature, without any protection except that which nature offers, had the ability to overcome the bitter cold and the storms, it would be so much easier for man."

The next time you find yourself strolling along Summit Avenue

or visiting Ft. Sauerkraut, consider paying his stone a visit. Emil often found inspiration in cemeteries. "As a young boy, I remember, I entered an ancient graveyard somewhere in Germany. The solemnity, the presence of the dead, the silent tombstones, and the inscribed verses were all inspiring, and so was the moth carved in stone at the entrance."

For Emil, the butterfly and the moth were powerful symbols of time, hardship, and the power of the spirit to endure. Certainly, in this time of stress and fear we could use a good metaphor. As for those we've lost, consider, as the snow covers over the land, the words of William Faulkner: "The past is never dead. It's not even past."
